## **Program Notes**

This piece is dedicated to Polly Irene O'Neal, who is now soaring as freely and luminously as a lustrous ray of light.

Light can be soft and pure, yet piercing and harsh. Its absence, darkness, can be empty, silent, and still. It has the ability to be free, yet confining, and void, yet all consuming. Based on primarily on intervallic relationships of a second and a seventh, this piece explores the complexities of light and its absence. I find these particular intervals confining, yet free.

Light paints the image of the sheen and shine of a speck of light in a dark place, longing to be free of the darkness that surrounds it. A reflection on the longing we sometimes feel to be free, yet consumed. A longing to be light.

## **Performance Notes**

This piece should be performed with the image of the sheen and shine of a speck of light in a dark space and its longing to be free of the darkness that surrounds it. The dotted quarter note in the first soprano part in measures four and nine should be sung with exactness. The release of "light" needs to be heard half a beat after the second soprano and alto move notes. Measures six, seven, ten, and eleven should be performed with no sense of time, measure, or uniformity between the parts. In measures eight and twelve where dotted lines are present and a tempo is marked, parts should realign and sense of time should return.
